The Dwelling Places of God

The Tabernacle and Temple of King Solomon
(Continued from Last Month.)

The possibility of building a temple really began with David, the leader of the Israelites at this time, who had just conquered Jerusalem. He made it the only capital of Israel but also the site of the permanent new Holy Place. This was more than likely due to several reasons. For the first time in Israel's history the civil and religious authorities were centralized geographically; Jerusalem had historic connection with the people of Israel dating back to the time of Abraham; Mount Moriah was assumed to be the "Mountain of God's inheritance" and it was a central neutral area between the north and south tribes.

It is written in 1 Chronicles 22:8 that David was a man of war and God helped David in his warfare. The Israelites had lost a war with the Philistines where the Ark of the Covenant was captured by them. Because of continuing difficulties and numerous plagues that they said was related to the Ark, the Philistines sent the Ark back to Israel. This returning of the Ark to Israel prompted David to begin thinking about a permanent place to house the Ark. In 1 Chronicles 17:1 David says to Nathan: Behold I am living in a house of cedar, but the Ark of the Covenant of the Lord is under tents. However, just after David made this statement to Nathan, God said to Nathan: "Go tell my servant David this is what the Lord says; "You are not meant to be the one to build me a temple to live in". God had always helped David with his wars but did not think a man of war should build His house. Yes, God would allow the temple to be built, but it would be done by David's son Solomon, a man of peace. David would however, contribute materials needed for the structure just as the people did.

No temple ever built has had so much written about it. A rugged mountain top was the site and a nation its builder. The building of this magnificent creation was said to be the plan of King David and was to be dedicated to the worship of the God of the Israelites. However, the architect, the plans, the design, and construction of this temple were determined by the excellence of God. But, it was actually left to King



Solomon to execute and perfect the designs and erect the temple that would be a fit place for the showing of God's presence with His people. And, the forests, the quarries, the mines of the world known at that time contributed the materials and the most skilled and knowledgeable workmen which included Hiram, King of Tyre and Hiram Abiff. This Great structure employed in its building 3 Grand Masters, 3,300 Masters or overseers of the work, 80,000 Fellowcrafts and 70,000 Entered Apprentices.

Zacchaeus finds his faith in Jesus Christ

From the Gospel according to Luke, Chapter 19, vs. 1-10

We have all heard the story of this little man. He was small in stature but in his town, he was a big, important man. He was the Chief Tax Collector for his area. He lived in the beautiful small city of Jericho near the river Jordan. He had become very wealthy. It was because of his position that he could make demands for money and no one dared to refuse him. People fear such a man, but no one would laugh at him.

This little man climbed a sycamore tree in order to be able to see Jesus Christ at a distance. Of course this made him look extremely undignified. It makes you wonder how much he knew about Jesus and His teachings. So there he was hanging on to a skinny tree waiting to get a look as Jesus passing by.

When Jesus came to this tree, He stopped and called him by name. No doubt Jesus had known about the tax collector by reputation, as well as by name. Without any coaxing, Zacchaeus pledged to give back half of his possessions - actually four times what he exorted from the people. Jesus than replied to him, "Today salvation has come to this house. " With those few words, Jesus said to him "Today salvation has come to this house, because he also is a son of Abraham, for the Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which was lost."



Jesus restored this public sinner to the place he had forfeited as being a descendant of Abraham. Zacchaeus was truly lost because of his deeds until Jesus had released him from those sins. He had been offered something much more lasting even than Gold - Salvation. Yet today - Jericho must be at least 50% Christian. It has two Greek Orthodox Churches. Although the Holy Land has problems with those groups that would pull apart Israel - this small country protects those Holy sites of Judaism, Christianity and Muslims.

This Gospel reading is like many others telling of Salvation and returning to Jesus Christ. We all have times when we may not be in harmony with God. We can return to the Lord - but we may not feel the necessity. All around us the Pillars of our Christian faith are being torn down. Many of our churches are busy re-defining the Christian faith. I hope this Gospel story will help those in need to re-accept the True Faith in God.

I have personally visited Jericho and have been to the actual site where Zacchaeus climbed the tree so he could see above the crowd to view Jesus Christ. I was a clergyman then and a guest of the Knights Templar Holyland trip in 1988. I was moved very much by the trip. What I hated to see & hear were some of the other pastors on the trip. One actually said he was tired of seeing Jesus in the Jack-in-the-box. I have hopes that those pastors who only see their congregation as a paycheck do not often see this beautiful country.



The Dwelling Places of God (Cont'd)

What was to become the most famous building in history, and recognized in great detail to Freemasonry, began as a modest building which was really to be the size of a small church or synagogue 90 feet long, 30 feet wide, and 45 feet high. To enter one would ascend ten stairs which led up through two bronze pillars named Boaz and Jachin. All Mason's know, or should know their meaning. Beyond this entrance was a porch and a small room which led to the main room called the Holy Place. This was the largest room of the temple. Its inner walls were decorated with elaborate carved cedar panels, the rooms adorned with precious stones. Here was housed the actual objects of the Tabernacle, the Golden Cherubim or lamp, the table bearing the sacred bread, and the tables bearing the ten lamps. We know from our Masonic teachings that the innermost room was separated from the Holy Place by a veil fabric and by a wall whose door was kept closed except for special occasions. Access to this room called the "Holy of Holies" was forbidden to all except the High Priest and to him except only once a year at the Holy Day of Atonement. Interestingly, what might not be known is that this room was an exact perfect cube. It is written that it was covered throughout with over twenty-three tons of gold.



Extensive studies were made in the late 1800's and early 1900's by numerous explorers and archeologists. These learned individuals have determined how the forests, the quarries, and the mines of the then known world contributed the materials for the Temple to the skilled men of Tyre and surrounding neighboring kingdoms employed to the building of this Temple and giving its symmetry as dictated by God.



Consider the most extraordinary skill and immense labor required to level the rugged top of Mt. Moriah. Its precipitous sides were faced with a wall of stone which was built up so it was perpendicular from the bottom of the valley so as to give it the appearance of great height. What is more often than not overlooked is that while construction continued Solomon's ideas for the Temple would change

and grow. It was as stated earlier that the original intention for the Temple was to be an enlarged version of the Tabernacle. But, before it was completed it took over twenty-years and its collection of buildings covered a space of thirty-six acres.



Just think of the high labor content it took to cut into the sides of Mt. Moriah and building a wall of these great stones, some of which were ten, twenty, and even forty feet in length with their proportional width and thickness. And, now mortise and bind the stones firmly to the sides of the mountain. Now raise that wall to an average height of one hundred and fifty feet of solid mason work, then fill up the whole area of 36 acres with more mason work while establishing a number of underground vaults and you have some idea of just the foundation area of the Temple. Remember that all of this preparatory work had to be completed before the Temple buildings themselves could be started. These underground vaults which were discovered beneath the site of the Temple are described in many writings of the explorers. A little fact not often stated, nor recognized is that the magnitude of Solomon's Temple structure and area is actually three-tenths larger than the Great Pyramid of Cheops. This is of some note because the Great Pyramid is usually called the largest artificial structure in the world.



It is also interesting to note where these large sized stones were found. Under the nearby adjacent mountain Bezetha is a cavern which was discovered around 1900. This entrance was under the north wall of Jerusalem about 100 yards east of the Damascus gate. This entrance was covered with trash and rubbish accumulated over many, many years. Because of this covering, its existence was unknown to the people of the world. Through time careful exploration of this cavern it was proved to be the "quarries of Solomon". It was determined that the formation of this mountain consisted of beds of rock mixed together with a

white limestone containing fossils. Below this rock bed there were deep stratum found to be the most important of all. It was a white, porous limestone, which in its condition was very soft and easily worked. But, when it was exposed to air it became very hard. This rock bed was about forty feet in thickness and continued beneath the whole city. So, it was here in Solomon's quarries that most of the stones were "hewed, squared and numbered" for the Temple and its foundations.

There is an interesting side note to this discussion involving Masonry: When the Masonic Lodge of North Yakima, Washington was planning to build a new Lodge, they wanted to place a "keystone" at the main arch of their Temple with stone from Solomon's quarries at Jerusalem. The stone was cut from the same quarries thought to be those of Solomon. However, it was lost in transit for considerable time, but ultimately traced and found and then placed in its proper place in their Temple.


There was an explorer named W. Maitland Abell who died in 1921 who had visited these quarries many times and described them thus: "Chippings and larger fragments of pure white stone were observed, scattered around the floor. In the walls there were little shelves that had been cut to support the small lamps used during the early period of the Temple. The smoke stains from the lamps, and the discarded fragments of stone, as well as unfinished work was noticed everywhere. It seemed to indicate that workmen of the quarries had just most recently departed. Yet nearly

thirty centuries had elapsed in time since the craftsmen of Solomon's period had been in the underground workshop. Evidence of their work efforts could be seen in nearly every part of the excavation."

The best findings of the workmen's skill was found in one of the side walls of the largest chamber. Here he found tiers of shaped stone which were all ready, and left to be severed from the main rock. Also, horizontal and vertical grooves had been cut into the wall of the quarry leaving many blocks uniform in size projecting from the main wall one above the other. These blocks were squared and finished except for the side attached to the wall. Some explorers believe that a lever was used to pry away the stone from the side of the main wall. But, the findings of W. Maitland Abell indicated that the detachment was by cleavage. While it would be nice to know how these blocks were actually removed from the side walls, it does not detract from these findings and their application to Solomon's Temple.

The floor of the quarry had a general dip in the direction of the Temple site and the present "Dome of the Rock", now the home of the Moslems. Since Mt. Bezetha is about 100 feet higher than Mt. Moriah, there was a gentle inclined slope which went from the cavern floor, out to the surface, and then down to the Temple walls. Because of this finding, there appears to be strong proof regarding the puzzling question of how the stones were conveyed to the Temple site. These stones, some of which were forty feet in length and estimated to be around one-hundred tons, were more than likely cut in the quarry and then moved into position by rollers of some sort. It would have been now unto impossible to haul such massive stone across the mountainous landscape of Judea. Secondly, there is no other quarry in this area around Jerusalem from which stones of this size could easily be transferred. To further substantiate this understanding, positive markings were found recorded on the stones themselves. Therefore, it surely seems to be established beyond any reasonable doubt that the great stone blocks were taken from the quarry of Mt. Bezetha, cut out, and then placed in their proper position in Solomon's Temple. To this day there is evidence that the eastern wall of the present Moslem structure is really part of, or built on the foundation laid by Solomon. Excavations by a Palestinian group discovered that nearly every stone had some very peculiar markings made by chisel, in Phoenician characters. This seems to indicate that these stones were hewn, squared and numbered in the quarry for some prearranged location in the Temple. Recall that our Masonic teachings inform us that "there was not heard the sound of hammer, nor axe, nor any tool of iron used in the building." The timbers were all felled and shaped in the forests of Lebanon. All work, both wood and stone, was perfectly fitted before being brought together at the Temple site. This all shows the talents of the craftsmen who Solomon engaged in the construction of his Temple and his ally King Hiram of Tyre.
